Student self-paced

Schools can post flyers or communicate with families through email and letters to parents; word of mouth from peers.



Takes very little work on the part of educators. Makes it easy to evaluate student self-motivation.

Teacher encouragement

Schools make available time in a computer lab, or with laptops or tablets; Schools can use Methodize as an activity for use by substitute teachers.

Prep course

The online program can be the entire curriculum for an ACT/SAT prep course, or supplemental materials for an existing curriculum.

Integrate into existing curriculum

Math and English teachers can merge Methodize into existing curricula and use custom quizzes and tests to buttress existing materials. The Vocabulary Builder tool can help younger students and ESL/ELL students.



Both ACT and SAT claim to test students on what they've learned in high school. This approach integrates test prep with the subjects being tested, and helps students see the relevance of test prep.

School counselor sessions

School counselors can use the program diagnostics to help students decide which test is better for them, as well as formulate preliminary college lists with students.



School counselors may have large caseloads, but Methodize's detailed reporting makes it easy to quickly view student progress and provide students and families with advice.

Competitive test prep

Points can be awarded to individuals or groups for achievements such as: most words mastered, most questions answered correctly, most tasks completed. The program can be used as an extra-credit vehicle in any class.
